Other climate impacts are being felt more gradually. Gradual or "slow-onset" impacts are changes people feel every day, but don't always get the press like massive storms and wildfires do. Examples of gradual impacts include:



temperature increases



changes in rainfall patterns



saltwater intrusion of farmland or drinking water

Both science and human experience tell us that slow-onset climate change will affect, and in some cases devastate, vulnerable communities in the future. It already impacts how, when, and where we move—and, in some cases, whether moving out of harm's way is even an option.
